The Dauphin Kings have traded 19-year-old defenceman Dawson Bacon to the Dryden Ice Dogs of the Superior International Junior Hockey League for 20-year-old forward Mark Ziobro.

Ziobro played in 43 contests last season, netting three goals and 10 points, with 53 penalty minutes.

Bacon appeared in 56 games with the Kings last year, finishing with one goal and six points, with 91 penalty minutes.

"Mark has the skill set that we've been looking to add to our forward group. He plays the game the right way and provides toughness and a professional approach," said Kings head coach and general manager Marc Berry on the team's website.

Ziobro, a native of Sherwood Park, Alta., is pleased to join the Kings.

"I'm extremely happy to be a part of the Kings. The community supports the team very well. Coming to a new team, the players and fans can expect a fast, hard working player who moves the puck and makes plays. I'm a gritty two-way player who is not scared to back down from anything and likes to be where the puck is," he said.

"I take pride in how hard I am to play against. I'll always stand up for my teammates and be a leader both on and off the ice. I'm looking forward to helping Dauphin make this season a successful one."

### Former King turns pro

Former Kings captain Emerson Hrynyk has signed a deal to join the Dundee Stars of the Elite Ice Hockey League in Great Britain.

Hrynyk spent two seasons with the Kings and served as captain in his second year, helping the club to a Sher-Wood Division title, losing to the Steinbach Pistons in the league final.

In total Hrynyk put up 31 points (two goals and 29 assists) in 107 games for the Kings in his two seasons, but was mostly known for his compete level, leadership and defensive play, making him a fan favourite.

The Okanagan Falls, B.C., native went on to play four years with Mount Royal University in the CIS/USports.

Hrynyk fondly remembers his time in Dauphin. "I really loved my time in Dauphin as a King and I was treated very well. Looking back it was my teammates, the staff, billets, fans and Corrina's Restaurant that really made it a great place to play hockey. I'm very thankful for the time I was able to spend in Dauphin," he said.

# Cross-country trek leads to Dauphin

You may have seen a man roller skiing around the city last Tuesday and wondered who he was and what he was up to.

The answer is simple. His name is Phil Shaw and he is traveling across Canada to raise money and awareness of Worldloppet, which is basically long distance cross-country skiing.

"I'm recruiting sponsors," he said.

"I have a couple of sponsors and it's not like certain sports that get a lot. So I'm making it happen. I visit some of the businesses."

Shaw, 50, started his cross-Canada trek in his hometown of Rosemère, Que., and hopes to end it in Vancouver. He anticipates it will take him about a month-and-a-half.

A professional cross-country ski racer, Shaw said the majority of Worldloppet races take place in Europe.

"There's two in Canada and there are about a dozen Worldloppets in a dozen different countries in Europe. It's a European thing," he said.

"And it's a league of ski races that have been in existence for about 50

participants, which pales in comparison to the European races.

"It's the smallest of all the Worldloppets, because there is very little interest among Canadian ski racers," he said.

Shaw got involved in the sport through school and family. He would occasionally cross-country ski 1.5-km to school in winter, which he said was the perfect distance for a kid.

Races are usually between 50-km and 90-km in distance. The Gatineau Loppet takes place in early February and is 51-km in length. Shaw said it attracts as many as 300

"It took me 10 minutes to ski there. And it would take me about 10 minutes by bus, so I would prefer to ski," he said.

"And in the summer and fall and spring, when there was no snow, I would walk all of it. I was rebellious, but in a sportsman's way."

In all there are about 15 to 18 races around the world. The circuit begins in August in Australia.

"They get a little bit of snow west of Sydney in the mountains. It's reliable snow, they have it every August. There's one in New Zealand and there's one in Japan. But most of them are in Europe," Shaw said.

The circuit continues throughout the winter and early spring.

Shaw has competed in most of the Worldloppets. But to make it happen, he has to raise money himself in order to compete.

"It's not like professional hockey. We don't get salaries. I have to make it happen. But it's a healthy sport. I think it's worth talking about and it's a green sport, environmentally friendly," he said.
